INFORMAL BRIEFING PAPER TO SUPPORT PREPARATORY DISCUSSIONS FOR THE FOURTH HIGH-LEVEL MEETING



Call to Action: United Nations Inter-Agency Task Force on the Prevention and Control of Non-Communicable Diseases

NCDs and mental health require whole-of-government and whole-of-society action. In 2011, Members States called for a coherent, coordinated UN system response.¹

The <u>Task Force</u> was established in 2013 to meet that call. <u>Reporting to ECOSOC</u>, it brings together 46 UN agencies, funds, programmes, intergovernmental organizations, and development banks, and is coordinated by a WHO secretariat.² The Task Force:

- 1. Has worked with over 40 countries through joint <u>UN</u> <u>programming missions</u> to galvanize high-level political commitment and strengthen multisectoral NCD responses.
- 2. Has delivered consistent, quality technical support to countries in developing, implementing and evaluating multisectoral action plans.
- 3. Has provided guidance and advocacy for NCDs and mental health to be included in UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Frameworks. In 2012/13, 45% of frameworks included NCDs. In 2022/23 it was 77%.³
- 4. Has worked with over 30 countries to develop national NCD and mental health investment cases, catalyzing action through greater engagement from finance ministries and partners.⁴

What the <u>2024 joint independent evaluation</u> on the Task Force says...

'The Task Force is an effective coordination mechanism and is an exemplar of the UN working as one.'

'The Secretariat is highly effective in convening Task Force members and coordinating its activities. There is a high demand for the Task Force's coordination role among Member States and UN agencies based on its unique mandate.'

'Member agencies respondents have considered that the Task Force is a valuable mechanism to develop joint programmes.'

5. Established the <u>Health4Life Fund</u> with UNDP, UNICEF and WHO to mobilize resources for country-led, multisectoral action on NCDs and mental health, and help close funding gaps, with funds now being

6. Has published widely used tools, including the <u>What government ministries need to know about NCDs</u> series, helping embed NCDs across sectors.

7. Has driven joint programmes like NCD NCD2030, SAFER and new platforms like the Legislators Initiative – supporting countries to build healthier, more resilient societies.

2025 is a pivotal year for NCDs, mental health and well-being, and for ensuring that the UN system is strongly positioned to respond to the increasing demands of Member States. With only five years to achieve the SDG targets, the 2025 political declaration will provide the platform for the ambitious scale up of the Task Force's work to support Member States deliver multisectoral whole-of-government and whole-of-society action.

The Task Force should... 'identify and mobilize Member States champion(s) to support the development and implementation of its 2026-2030 strategy'.

Recommendation from the joint independent evaluation

In the political declaration we urge Heads of State and Government to:

- ✓ Call upon United Nations agencies, development banks and other regional and intergovernmental organizations, including United Nations Country Teams, to scale up support to Member States in delivering whole-of-government and whole-of-society action to prevent and control NCDs and improve mental health, including through: (i) fiscal, legislative and regulatory action; (ii) tackling social, commercial and economic determinants of health; (iii) increasing, and maximising the impact of domestic and catalytic resources; and (iv) strengthening governance and accountability.

 In line with the 2018 political declaration (Paragraph 47), ECOSOC resolutions on the Task Force and the Task Force's Terms of Reference
- ✓ Call upon the United Nations Inter-Agency Task Force on the Prevention and Control of Non-communicable Diseases to scale up its work, taking into account the joint independent evaluation, in coordinating UN system agencies and intergovernmental organizations to provide technical and political support to Member States, including through the Health4Life Fund.

 In response to the 2018 political declaration⁶ and the 2025 UN Secretary-General progress report⁷

At the high-level meeting we encourage Member States and partners to:

- > Use the Task Force as an 'exemplar of the UN working as one', for UN reform under UN80.
- Support the development and implementation of the Task Force's 2026-2030 strategy.
- Scale up sustainable funding for the Task Force, as an exemplar of the UN working as one, to enable it to provide the necessary resources to assist Member States meet the NCD- and mental healthrelated SDG targets, including by resourcing the Health4Life Fund.
