A. Objectives and participating agencies

1. The twentieth meeting of the United Nations Inter-Agency Task Force on the Prevention and Control of Non-communicable Diseases (Task Force) was held on 8–10 March 2023, with the participation of 23 Task Force Member organizations.¹ WHO and the Secretariat of the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (Convention Secretariat) chaired the meeting. The agenda and list of participants are presented in annexes 1 and 2.
2. The objectives of the meeting were to: (i) review progress on actions agreed at the nineteenth meeting (1–3 November 2022); (ii) receive updates on joint programmes and other workstreams; (iii) reflect on the work conducted by the Task Force during the past 10 years; and (iv) discuss how the Task Force could become more effective and propose activities necessary to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

B. Review of the summary of the nineteenth meeting

3. Task Force Secretariat reviewed progress in actions agreed at the nineteenth meeting.

Actions

- B1. Task Force Strategy 2022–2025 indicators to be finalized (Task Force monitoring and evaluation group)
- B2. Continue to identify opportunities to highlight the work of the Task Force at meetings of senior management and governing bodies (Conference of the Parties to the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC), UN Habitat, UNHCR, OHCHR, Joint Meeting of the Executive Boards of UNDP, UNFPA, UNICEF, UNOPS, UN Women, the World Food Programme (WFP) and the Task Force Secretariat).

C. Tobacco control

4. The Convention Secretariat provided a briefing on the tenth session of the Conference of the Parties to the WHO FCTC (COP10) and the third session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products (MOP3). COP10 (20–25 November 2023) and MOP 3 (27–30 November 2023) will take place in Panama, with the themes “Promoting healthier lives together” for COP10 and “More Parties, greater traceability, less illicit trade” for MOP3. International intergovernmental organizations should apply to the Convention Secretariat for observer status for the COP and MOP 90 days before the opening of the sessions.
5. The Convention Secretariat and UNDP reported on the implementation of the Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products. A mapping exercise was initiated to identify opportunities for collaboration with other UN agencies to support the implementation of the Protocol. A report will be prepared on ongoing activities, available resources and how the Parties to the Protocol could benefit from them. Examples of activities to be included in the report are the UNODC work on illicit trade, the UNDP and OECD joint initiative “Tax Inspectors without Borders”, and UNDP’s work on taxation for sustainable development.
6. The Convention Secretariat described progress in the development of the Alert Network for Tobacco

Industry Involvement (ANTII), which serves as an early warning system for Task Force members on potential and actual tobacco industry involvement or interference in events or activities related to UN agencies. Focal points from each Task Force member organization are being identified to participate in this network.

7. UNDP presented sectoral briefs, developed with the Convention Secretariat, to provide information for government ministries on tobacco control and to outline the actions that each ministry could take to advance tobacco control.
8. The Task Force Secretariat, WHO and the Convention Secretariat have continued to promote UN smoke-free campuses and have identified entry points in the Geneva, Bangkok, Rome, New York, Addis Ababa, Vienna and Nairobi campuses. Meetings with the UN Office in Geneva and WFP have been held to discuss current smoking policies and barriers to achieving completely smoke-free campuses.
9. WHO, in partnership with WFP and FAO, launched an initiative for alternative livelihoods for tobacco farmers in Kenya in 2022. Under this initiative, over 1500 tobacco farmers have changed their crops from tobacco to high-iron beans. The initiative is planned to reach at least 4000 farmers by the end of 2024 and will soon expand to Zambia. The Convention Secretariat informed the meeting about the draft Article 17 toolkit developed for WHO FCTC Parties to promote switching from tobacco growing and asked relevant UNIATF members for feedback. The Convention Secretariat is also working with UNEP to show how the tobacco production system and tobacco products damage the environment.
10. The theme of the 2023 World No Tobacco Day is “Grow food, not tobacco” in order to encourage governments to end subsidies on tobacco growing and to mobilize governments and policy-makers to improve food security and nutrition, raise awareness about viable alternative livelihoods, support the combat against desertification and environmental degradation, and expose tobacco industry efforts to impede alternative livelihoods work. Potential partners in the WHO campaign include WFP, FAO, the Convention Secretariat, UNCCD and UNCDF.
11. WHO informed the meeting about the launch of the Tobacco Cessation Consortium during the 2022 World Health Summit. The Consortium brings together non-state actors to support WHO in scaling up the supply of tools and services to help tobacco users quit through various market-shaping strategies and in leveraging digital and technical solutions to increase the demand for quitting.
12. The Convention Secretariat described revisions to the reporting mechanisms of Article 21 of the WHO FCTC and Article 32 of the Protocol. As part of the revision, the use of official UN statistics on tobacco would replace or supplement data currently collected by the reporting instruments to reduce the burden on Parties. Agencies are encouraged to discuss ever better data-sharing and coordination with the Convention Secretariat.

Actions

C1. Explore how to advocate for and highlight SDG target 3.a (accelerated implementation of WHO FCTC) in the preparation for and organization of the 2025 High-level Meeting on NCDs (Convention Secretariat, OHCHR, Task Force Secretariat, UNDP, WHO, WHO Office at the UN).

C2. Explore how the Summit for the Future (22–23 September 2024) could be used as a platform to highlight the role of the tobacco industry in undermining progress in reaching the SDG targets (Convention Secretariat, OHCHR, Task Force Secretariat, WHO, WHO Office at the UN).

Briefing on COP10 and MOP3

C3. Invite observers from intergovernmental organizations to attend COP10 (20–25 November 2023) and MOP3 (27–30 November 2023) in Panama (All).

C4. Encourage Task Force members to apply for observer status to COP10 and MOP3 before the deadlines

of 22 August 2023 and 29 August 2023, respectively (All).

Implementation of the Protocol

C5. Prepare a report for Parties to the Protocol on accessing UN-wide support for implementing the Protocol (Convention Secretariat, OHCHR, Task Force Secretariat, UNDP and UNODC).

C6. Share background information on the Protocol and on ongoing health tax work with Task Force members (Convention Secretariat).

C7. Finalize and disseminate the brief on the impact of tobacco taxation on low-income groups (WHO).

Model policy (Article 5.3 of the WHO FCTC)

C8. Establish and operationalize the ANTII network. Agencies to respond to the Convention Secretariat's e-mail requesting ANTII focal points (Convention Secretariat, All).

FCTC 2030

C9. Finalize sectoral briefs and share them with Task Force members to review, identify additional sectors to be included and disseminate further (Convention Secretariat, Task Force Secretariat, UNDP).

Tobacco-free UN campuses

C10. Continue to reach out to UN agencies at different geographical locations to provide guidance (Convention Secretariat, Task Force Secretariat, WHO).

C11. Agencies that do not have a tobacco-free campus to consider establishing one (member organizations of the Task Force that are not tobacco-free).

C12. Agencies to align with the UN General Assembly recommendation in resolution 63/8 to stop selling tobacco products on their premises, including tax-free sales (All).

Alternative livelihoods

C13. Support scaling up of the WHO Tobacco Free Farms pilot project in Kenya and Zambia (All).

C14. Review the alternative livelihood draft toolkit developed by the Convention Secretariat by 25 March 2023 before finalization (All)

C15. Explore links between nutrition, alternatives to tobacco farming and impacts on the environment in order to identify potential collaboration (Convention Secretariat, UN Nutrition and WHO).

2023 World No Tobacco Day

C16. Members to disseminate campaign material and amplify messages (All)

C17. Encourage heads of agencies to record 30 second videos for the campaign (WHO and other members of the Task Force)

Data exchange and analysis

C18. Encourage Task Force members to inform WHO and the Convention Secretariat of opportunities to share tobacco-related data (Convention Secretariat and members of the Task Force).

D. Review of the small island developing states (SIDS) high-level technical meeting on NCDs

13. WHO provided an overview of the SIDS high-level technical meeting held in January 2023 in Barbados. A meeting report is being finalized with recommendations on: (i) sustainable and innovative financing; (ii) the impact of climate change and integration in emergency preparedness and response; (iii) strengthening multisectoral engagement and policy coherence; and (iv) commercial determinants of health and addressing conflicts of interest. The technical meeting will be followed by a ministerial meeting in June 2023 in Barbados, which will feed into the Second High-level meeting on Universal Health Coverage in September 2023 and the fourth high-level meeting on NCDs in 2025.
14. During the technical meeting, the Task Force held a side-event on “A coherent UN-system response to support SIDS countries scale up action on NCDs and mental health”. Two reports were prepared, on UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Frameworks in SIDS, and on UN agency activities beyond WHO in SIDS.
15. The WHO Regional Office for Africa indicated that the Task Force could support Cabo Verde and Mauritius in climate change and NCDs, as these countries have a strong in-country WHO presence and ongoing NCD activities.

Actions

D1. Task Force Secretariat to work with WHO and other members to provide inputs to the outcome document of the SIDS Ministerial Conference (Task Force Secretariat, WHO, Convention Secretariat, and other members of the Task Force).

D2. Explore the possibility of a joint mission on NCDs and climate change in a SIDS in the WHO African Region (Task Force Secretariat, WHO Regional office for Africa, other members of the Task Force).

E. Health4Life Fund

16. The Health4Life Fund Secretariat and UNDP described activities with the founding strategic partners and other development partners. The next steering committee meeting is planned for June 2023 in New York City.

F. Updates on selected global events, activities, workstreams, joint programmes and partners

17. UNHCR and WHO reported on meetings on NCDs in emergencies and humanitarian settings. A regional technical meeting was held in Cairo, Egypt, in December 2022, and the following meetings are planned: (i) Ukraine and neighbouring countries (Slovakia, April 2023); (ii) a webinar (31 May–1 June 2023); and (iii) a meeting organized by the WHO Regional Office for South-East Asia (Cox’s Bazar, Bangladesh, June 2023). Dates have not yet been confirmed for the other WHO regions. A global high-level technical meeting will take place on 14–16 November 2023 in Copenhagen, Denmark, and a global refugee forum will take place between 13–15 December 2023 in Geneva.
18. The Task Force Secretariat and UNDP described the joint programme to catalyse multisectoral action on NCDs (NCD2030), including NCD, mental health and primary health care investment case work, and the new methodologies that are being developed for assistive technology, air pollution, alcohol control, nutrition, advanced clinical interventions modules and digital health. A study on the impact of 13 NCD investment cases has also been conducted. Tools to support countries in implementing the recommendations from the investment cases are being developed. An update was also provided on work funded by the European Union.
19. WHO and UNDP described progress on SAFER (harmful used of alcohol) work in Nepal and Uganda,

including challenges and lessons learnt.

20. OHCHR presented the work of the Human Rights Team, including: (i) the 2023–2024 workplan; (ii) a publication with questions and answers; (iii) a set of advocacy messages; and (iv) a presentation to the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights. A follow up briefing will be conducted on mental health. Further collaboration will be explored between the Task Force and other UN human rights mechanisms, including the Committee on the Rights of the Child.
21. United for Global Mental Health was invited as an observer to describe the work of the Interagency Working Group on Mental Health and Communicable Disease comorbidities, including: (i) the development of an e-learning module for Global Fund stakeholders on the linkages between mental health and HIV and tuberculosis; (ii) guidance notes on planning and budgeting for integrating services and programmes; and (iii) a toolkit for national-level programme managers and stakeholders.
22. The Task Force Secretariat informed the meeting that the Working Group on NCDs and Communicable Disease Comorbidities was reviewing its terms of reference.
23. The UN-Nutrition Secretariat described the activities of the Nutrition Technical Working Group. The Group has prepared a report on the links between nutrition and climate change, biodiversity and pollution. Areas for country support include: (i) integrating a healthy environment with health and food systems; and (ii) sustainable food systems and healthy diets. The UN-Nutrition Secretariat supported the development of the nutrition investment case methodology.
24. WHO and the Task Force described plans to conduct country missions on ambient air pollution.
25. Google was invited as an observer to describe its collaboration with WHO, including: (i) in the Tobacco Cessation Consortium; (ii) by providing health information to Fitbit users during the 2022 World Cup; (iii) in the mental health campaign “Arts + Health & Wellbeing”; and (iv) building digital health tools for community health workers.

Actions

- F1. Task Force Secretariat to continue to work with WHO in planning how the UN system can contribute to the preparation of the fourth high-level meeting on NCDs in 2025 to ensure that Task Force members provide timely, effective input (WHO, Task Force Secretariat, Convention Secretariat, other members of the Task Force).
- F2. Task Force Secretariat to work with WHO to identify how Task Force members can make timely, effective contributions to regional consultations on NCDs in emergencies and to the global high-level meetings on NCDs in SIDS and emergencies in 2023 (WHO, Task Force Secretariat, other members of the Task Force).
- F3. NCD2030: (i) finalise and publish the impact assessment study of NCD investment cases; (ii) explore how SIDS countries can benefit from investment cases; and (iii) identify ways for Task Force members to support dissemination of findings (UNDP, WHO, Task Force Secretariat).
- F4. Human rights team to finalize its workplan and continue its activities (Human Rights Team).
- F5. Interagency Working Group on Mental Health to expand its activities beyond the Global Fund and HIV/TB/Malaria and provide input into the preparatory process of upcoming high-level events (Interagency Working Group).
- F6. The Thematic Working Group on NCDs and Communicable Disease Comorbidities to finalize its terms of reference and agree on an action plan (Working Group).
- F7. WHO and the Task Force to continue exploring in-country missions on ambient air pollution (Task Force Secretariat, WHO, other members of the Task Force).
- F8. Nutrition Technical Working Group to: (i) finalize messages and identify entry points with the NCD Environment group and Human Rights team; (ii) provide inputs to a special session at an IATF meeting on

human rights, including engagement of the Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food; (iii) liaise with the WHO Nutrition team to prepare an advocacy statement for the run up to the UHC high level meeting in September; (iv) take part in a joint mission in a SIDS; (v) refine the Nutrition Guidance to provide technical support to two countries to include evidence about policy and legislative implementation; (vi) finalize, publish and disseminate the methodology and Zimbabwe nutrition investment case report; (vii) explore opportunities to bring NCDs more strongly into food system dialogues through the Coalition of Action for Healthy Diets from Sustainable Food Systems (Nutrition Technical Working Group).

G. Report to ECOSOC

26. The deadline for submission of the Task Force’s 2023 ECOSOC report to UNDESA is 30 April 2023 for consideration in July 2023. Members will be asked for inputs in the coming weeks.

Action

G1. Task Force members to provide inputs to the ECOSOC report (All)

H. Task Force awards

27. This year, the Task Force awards will be a collaboration between the Task Force, ITU and the WHO Department of Digital Health and Innovation to recognize champions in digital health. The awards are to be announced at the annual Friends of the Task Force meeting, which is scheduled during the high-level week of the UN General Assembly.

Actions

H1. Task Force members to consider participating in the Task Force awards selection committee (All).

I. Ten years on: review of the Task Force

28. Two roundtable discussions were held. The first reviewed progress made by the Task Force over the past 10 years and areas in which more could have been done. To stimulate discussion, the NCD Alliance was invited to describe how the UN Task Force is seen from outside and how it could scale up its work. The NCD Alliance highlighted the importance of NCD financing and proposed a second conference on NCD financing. The Task Force Secretariat agreed to work with Members of the Task Force to support their efforts to secure a second NCD financing conference.
29. WHO presented the results of a recent survey of the public’s understanding of NCDs. The aim of the survey was to understand: (i) the levels of awareness and understanding of NCD conditions; (ii) public understanding of terminology and experience with NCDs; (iii) awareness of risk factors; and (iv) actions and behaviours to address/mitigate the risk of NCDs. Key messages that emerged were as follows: (i) recognition of the term ‘NCDs’ was low but recognition of individual diseases was high; (ii) to be more successful, outreach efforts or campaigns to promote actions and policies to address NCDs and their risk factors must be communicated in ways that are easy to understand and closer to people’s experience; (iii) except for cancer, many people underestimate how harmful NCDs are, particularly with regards to diabetes and lung disease; (iv) there is considerable room for improvement in increasing people’s awareness of the links between NCDs and their risk factors; and (v) there is strong public support for policy measures to address NCDs, including typically unpopular measures, such as imposing new taxes. Many people were, however, uncertain about the actions they could take to mitigate the risk of certain NCDs. It was agreed that the Task Force and its members should take these findings into consideration when implementing its 2022–2025 strategy and delivering its programmes and activities.

30. Discussions at the first roundtable indicated that, while the Task Force had achieved much over the past 10 years, more action was required between now and 2030. The current Task Force strategy was considered to be still appropriate; however, as the 2030 Agenda is an integrated one, human rights are an integral part of its mandate, and it is therefore important that the Task Force gives more attention to the underlying determinants of health, particularly poverty.
31. The second roundtable addressed making the Task Force more effective and the action required from the Task Force for achieving the SDGs. Key areas discussed included the need to: (i) raise the profile of the Task Force; (ii) increase the number of country missions and activities post- pandemic; and (iii) strengthen the Task Force as an enabler for its members and partners. The Secretariat described plans for a new “co-branded” website and the opportunities that this would provide for disseminating the work of Task Force members.

J. Dates and venues of future Task Force meetings

32. It was agreed that the twenty-first meeting be held in the third quarter of 2023, in a hybrid format. IAEA expressed interest in hosting the meeting.

Actions

J1. The twenty-first meeting of the Task Force to be held in autumn 2023. Members to inform the Task Force Secretariat of competing events in order to avoid those dates. The Task Force Secretariat to explore dates, hosts and potential venues.
